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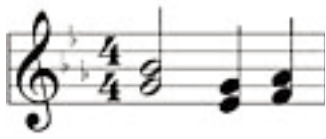

# WILLIAMS QUILT SHOW AND BEYOND

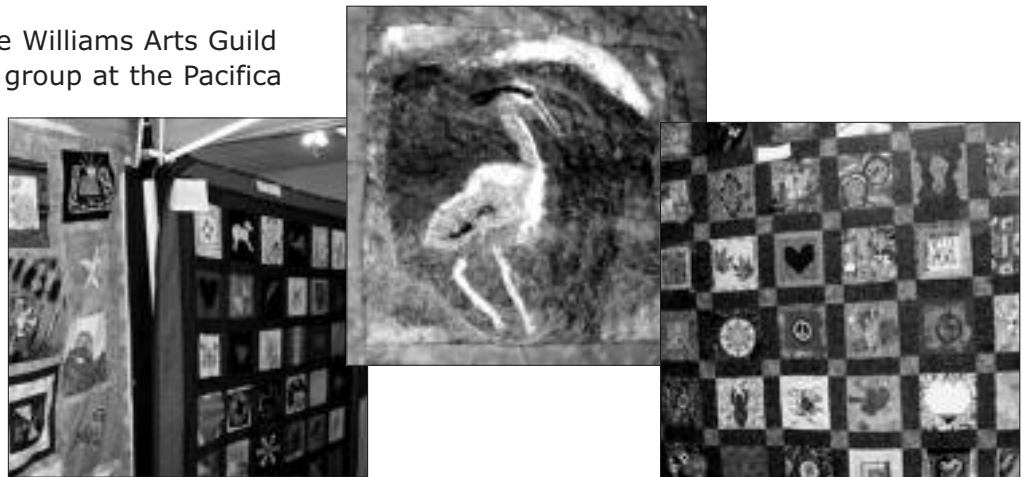

# IMAGINATIVE USES OF PDA'S FOR GARDENING

## WILLIAMS WEATHERWATCH: FEBRUARY 2009

February continued the pattern of a dry winter, with only about half of the average rainfall for the month (2.26" vs. 4.19"). Our rainy season total since Sept. 1, 2008, is now 14.85", which is 58% of average. Although rain was measured on half of February's 28 days, there was no major rain event.

We did see a trace of snow on five days. Fog only occurred on two mornings at the beginning of the month. The high temperature in Feb. was 62° F on the 22nd. The low temp. of 25° F was recorded on three mornings: the 1st, 2nd, and 18th.

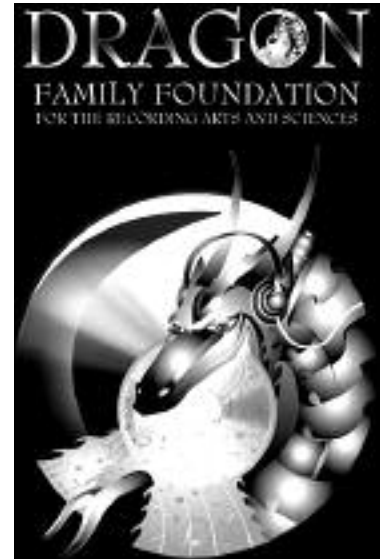
